ERNEST MONTANDEN DIES AT HOOD RIVER

Funeral From Congregational Church in Ione

Ernest Montanden died in the Hood River Hospital at 4 A. M., Feb. 15, 1930, at the age of 69 years, 8 months and 25 days.

Funeral services were held in Ione, from the Congregational church, Feb. 17, and interment was made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery at this place.

Mr. Montanden was born in Canton Berne, Switzerland, May 21, 1861. In company with a twin brother, he came to America in

in 1881. For some time the two boys made their home with an uncle, Mr. Balsiger, of Highland, Illinois. In 1897 they moved to Arkansas where they engaged in farming. Here his brother lost his life by drowning. Mr. Montanden came to Oregon in 1899 and spent the rest of his days in Ione.

He will be greatly missed in our little city. He was a friend to everyone, loyal and true. He was an earnest Christian and a faithful member of the Congregational Church. He was a great lover of beauty, taking especial delight in flowers which he grew in profusion about his home and shared liberally with his friends.

He leaves to mourn his death a sister and a brother, living in Switzerland, six cousins, Louis, Paul, Arnold, John and Fred Balsiger and Mrs. Charley Allenger, and a host of friends.

The funeral services were in charge of Rev. W. W. Head, pastor of the Congregational Church. The floral offerings were many and beautiful. The six Rietmann brothers, Victor, Werner, David, Otto, Robert and Omar acted as pall bearers.

IN THE COUNTY COURT OF STATE OF OREGON FOR MORROW COUNTY.

In the Matter of the Waiving of Penalty and Interest on Delinquent Taxes for the Year 1927 and prior years.

ORDER

Whereas the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon at its regular session in the year, 1919 enacted a statute entitled, "An Act Authorizing any County Court or Board of County Commissioners to waive or reduce penalty or interest or both, upon unpaid taxes", said statute being designated as Chapter 182 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1929; and,

Whereas, it is the opinion of the County Court of Morrow County, in regular session, on this 14th day of February, 1930, that the waiving of the penalty and part of the interest on unpaid taxes for the year 1927 and the years prior to 1927, would facilitate the collection of such unpaid taxes in said County.

It is therefore hereby ordered that all penalties on unpaid and delinquent taxes for the year 1927 and all years prior to 1927, levied for the year 1927 and the years prior to the year 1927 by the levying board of Morrow Co., State of Oregon, be and the same are hereby waived, and that all
