Heppner went out with the first three up, Ione made one run on Reitmman, a single followed by a strikeout a walk some juggling and another strikeout. Heppner made one in the second with Peterson fanning, D. Bleakman hit by pitcher, stole second and scored on an error by Akers and Ritchie trying to field a slow grounder. Akers started the second with a walk and scored while Heppner was making an error followed by a passed ball. Heppner was out one two three in the fourth and Ione put up four men with two strikeouts and a force out of Engleman who had reached first on Sprowels error. Heppner made their first score in the fifth, Hake struck out B. Bleakman hit a single and Everson fell and when he corraled the ball Bleakman was on third and scored on Ferguson's single. Reitmman reached first on an error by B. Bleakman and scored on a single by L.

School District No. 25 will receive sealed bids up to and including July 10, 1930 for the following proposed bus routes all included within the boundaries of Dist. No. 25, and for janitor service, for the school year 1930-1931, service to begin September 8th, 1930.
