## HARVEST PROGRESS

Edward A. Lindelen started harvest operations, Tuesday. He states that his wheat is making twenty bushels.

The first grain delivered at the Jord in Elevator was rye from the Laxton McMurray ranch.

The new wheat crop is being rapidly moved into the elevators and warehouses. It seems to be the general opinion that the average yield is around fifteen bushels to the acre. Considerable old wheat is moving along the line. Mr. Louis Balsiger states that the Balfour-Guarrie Company have recently shipped eighteen cars from Lexington, Heppner and Ione.

The first carload shipment of 1930 wheat left Ione Tuesday night. The consignment consisted of three cars and was raised by Lee Beckner and Henry Gorger.

As Edw. Rietmann was moving his combine up a steep hill preparatory to starting his wheat harvest, the leveling device broke, letting the heavy machine topple over. Only slight damage was done to the machinery, but his harvest work was delayed several days.
