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MRS. BARBARA ANN RITCHIE PASSES

LONG A RESIDENT OF IONE, SHE DIED AT THE HOME OF HER SON

FUNERAL SERVICES AND INTERMENT AT IONE

Funeral services were held at the Congregational church in Ione at one a. m. on Friday, August 8, for Mrs. Barbara Ann Ritchie, who died in Portland at the home of her son, George W. Ritchie, on Wednesday, August 6, at the age of eighty five years. Rev. W. Head, pastor of the Congregational Church, conducted the funeral services and interment was made in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Barbara Ann Heyburn was born August 6, 1845 in Lee County, Virginia. In 1865 she was united in marriage to Alexander Ritchie and to this union eleven children were born, seven of whom survive; George W., Mrs. Ida Cochran and Mrs. Rosa Miller of Portland, Samuel J. of Lexington, Charles M. of Heppner, Fred B. and Mrs. Alice Cochran of Ione. Mrs. Ritchie and her husband came to Morrow County in April, 1884 and filed on a homestead just north of Ione. Five years later Mr. Ritchie died. A few years later Mrs. Ritchie moved into Ione where she made her home until January 1, 1930, when she moved to Portland.

In the 45 years she lived in and near Ione, she witnessed many changes. She watched the building of the railroad through our little valley, her husband being one of the laborers who helped with the work. She endured all the hardships of a pioneer mother and her passing is mourned, not only by her seven children but by thirtythree grandchildren and twentyfour great grandchildren as well and by many friends. Six of her grandsons acted as pallbearers in accordance with her wish. They were Arthur Ritchie, Olin Ritchie, George Ritchie, Jr., Lonnie Ritchie, Walter Cochran and Elmer Cochran. Relatives from out of town who attended Mrs. Ritchie's funeral were Mr. and Mrs. George Ritchie and their children, George, Leona and Ellen of Portland; Mr. and Mrs. Albert Hennig and two children, Mrs. Ida Cochran, Mrs. Mrs. Rosa Miller and Mrs. Fay Bucknum also of Portland; Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Ritchie and family of Lexington; Mr. and Mrs. Charley Ritchie of Heppner and Walter C. Cochran of Arlington.

The greater number of the relatives returned at once to their homes. A few remained for a few days visit with friends and relatives. Mrs. Fay Bucknum visited over Saturday with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charley Ritchie of Heppner. The Hennig party stayed until Sunday and when they departed were accompanied by Mrs. Fred Ritchie who was going to Vernonia for a visit with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Kirk, Mrs. George Ritchie and daughter left on the stage, Tuesday morning. Going with them was Mrs. Ritchie's nephew, Norman Griffin, who will spend a few weeks in Portland.
