## IONE HOTEL BURNS SUNDAY MORNING

### ANCIENT HOSTELRY TOTALLED DESTROYED

The Ione hotel was completely destroyed by fire between seven and eight o'clock Sunday morning. It is believed the fire started from an over heated stove. The hotel had been closed while some repair work was being being done, and E. H. Stiles, the man who was doing the work, was sleeping and preparing his own meals in the building. The fire was under way when discovered by him. The adjoining building occupied by Frank Engelm's pastime was damaged by fire and water. There was no wind that morning which made it possible to keep the fire from spreading. The loss, both to Mr. Frank Engleman and to Jack Camble, owner of the hotel building, is partly covered by insurance.

Also showing the probable receipts of said city other than by direct taxation upon real and personal property for the year 1931.

### FOOT BALLGAME

The last football game of the season, Ione vs. Heppner, was played before a very large crowd of spectators on Iones field, Friday, November 7, and resulted in a 7-0 victory for Ione. This game had been looked forward to with great anticipation and played to be as fully as exciting as it was expected to be.

Ione's kick was received by Heppner on their own 25 yard line and was held for a small gain. The first two quarters were equally hard fought, neither team showing any appreciable advantage, though Ione showed a slight edge in playing ability. In the third quarter Ione executed a fake play which resulted in a punt on Heppner's 7 yard line from their own 49 yard line. In this play McCabe faked injur-

ies to his knee and walked across the field as if he was going off the field; Estab was so cleverly substituted for smouse to deceive the Heppner team to think that the substitution was for McCabe. When the ball was snapped McCabe ran down the field for a pass from Swanson who was on the other side of the field. McCabe was tackled on Heppner 7 yard line. Heppner relieved the ball on downs and immediately punted out of danger. Ione's punt was not run back very far and beautifully executed end runs by McCabe and Eubanks took the ball over the Heppner goal line, scoring the only touchdown of the game. The conversation was made by a pass, Swanson to Eubank. Ione again threatened Heppner's goal line in the 4th

quarter but failed to make the second touchdown. Though Heppner's playing was well organized they never threatened the Ione goal line except once in the second quarter.

### Statesman's Tact Won Friendship of Dickens

Charles Dickens, as is well known, had very little use for politicians. Indeed, throughout all his writings this disdain, which amounts frequently to utter disgust, is reflected. It was but natural, therefore, that Premier Disraeli should come under his fire.

Referring to the statesman once in private conversation, he spoke bitterly of "that dog" carrying on in parliament. Within a few months he met Disraeli for the first time. He could hardly wait to write to a friend, "What a delightful fellow he is! What a pity it is that he should ever have abandoned literature for politics!"

The incident is significant from two standpoints. It is another striking illustration of how a man big and broad and sympathetic enough to conceive "Dombey and Son," "Little Dorrit" and "David Copperfield" is happy to correct a hastily formed erroneous impression. And it reveals again the suave dexterity of Benjamin Disraeli. It is evident that the premier talked not of politics that day to Charles Dickens, but of literature. And he made of him a friend. Disraeli was always making friends—just like that. —Omaha World Herald.
