The wet claim that the number of alcoholic deaths has increased under prohibition is not a valid claim. While there have been some variations, the facts do not bear out the claim. Moonshine and a "synthetic" whiskey are, no doubt, more deadly than "good liquor." Even so, the reports of the United States Bureau of Statistics, given in the World Almanac for 1930, show that the number of alcoholic deaths for the eight years just prior to prohibition was 5.2 per hundred thousands of the population, while for the first eight years after prohibition the number was 2.8 per hundred thousand of the population, a decline of nearly one half.

Christopher P. Connolly estimates that the number of lives saved by prohibition is greater than the number of lives Uncle Sam lost in the World War. He shows this in the October number of Religious Education.

C. Swarney completed a well received program to the large crowd present.

Public installation of the Irrigon and Greenfield Subordinate Grange officers, followed the lecturer's program, with Brother Chas. Dillabaugh of Greenfield, officiating. Brother Dillabaugh, 72 years of age, a Grange veteran of many years standing, ably conducted the installation without a manual.

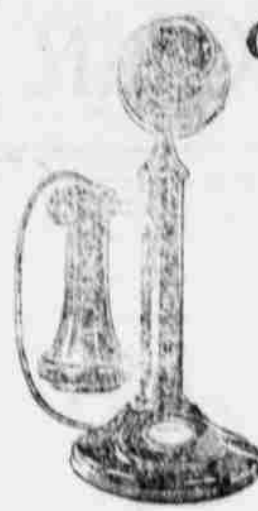

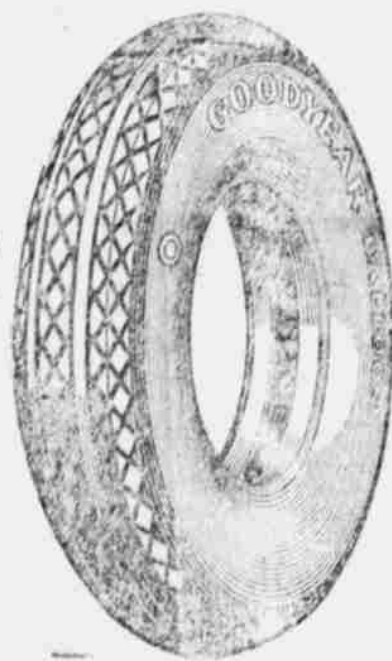
