Among the objects lately sold at Sotheby's were such unusual treasures as a Sixteenth century German woodman's hatchet, complete with maker's marks, and what might, to the uninitiate, appear to be a blunt steel rapier with the half-length figure of a girl as handle. It is actually, however, that great rarity, an official measure of the king's alnager, an ancient functionary whose duties were to inspect and measure cloth. His office was abolished in the reign of William III.—London Mail.

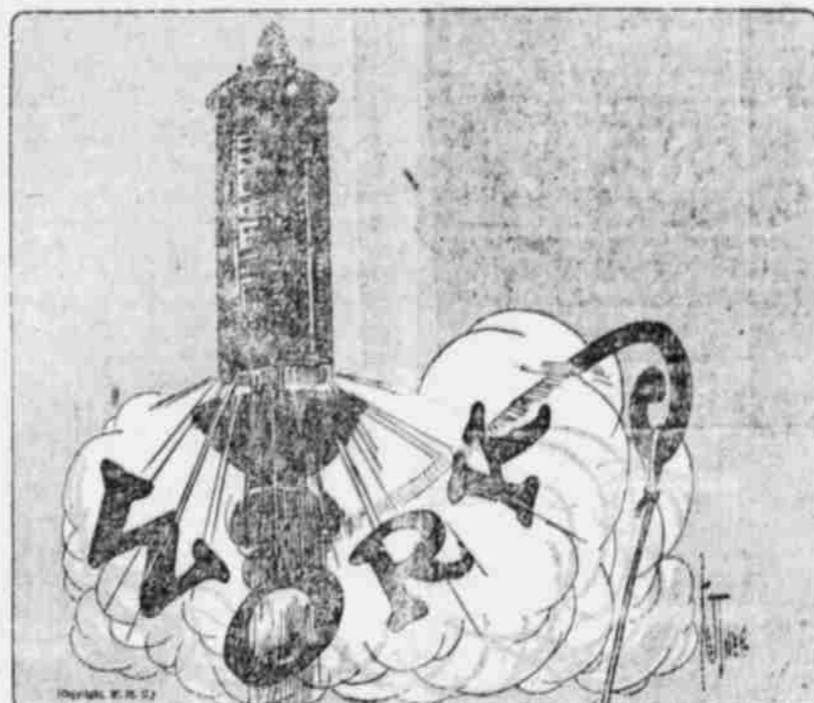

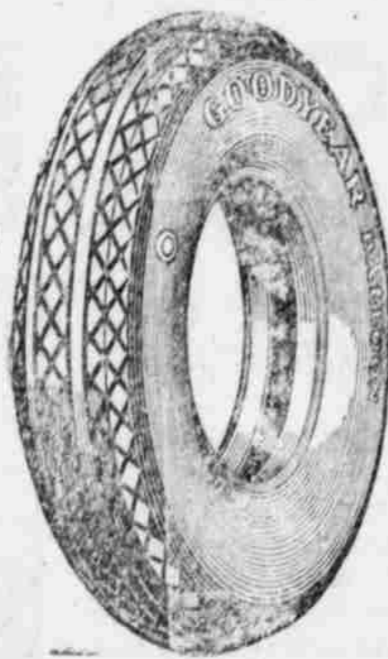
