BIG TRANSPORTATION MEET AT ALPINE HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING

SPEAKERS FROM PORTLAND AND LEWISTON

Through correspondence with the Columbia Valley Association and the Western Inland Waterways Corporation, it has been arranged for R. H. Kipp, Executive Secretary, Portland, Oregon, and Capt. Arthur Ward, Managing Director, Lewiston, Idaho, and others to address a meeting of those interested in transportation on the Columbia River at the Alpine High School Building, Feb. 16th, 1931, at 7:30 P. M.

These gentlemen have reported the progress of plans to have barges on the River by early fall of 1931, and have figured a saving on the wheat shipments alone of a million dollars annually to Oregon and Washington, with an estimated saving of three million dollars annually on all commodities shipped to and from inland territory, besides other benefits which will come from industrial development.

favor of Ione and the last half ended with it 17-15 with Ione still on the leading end.

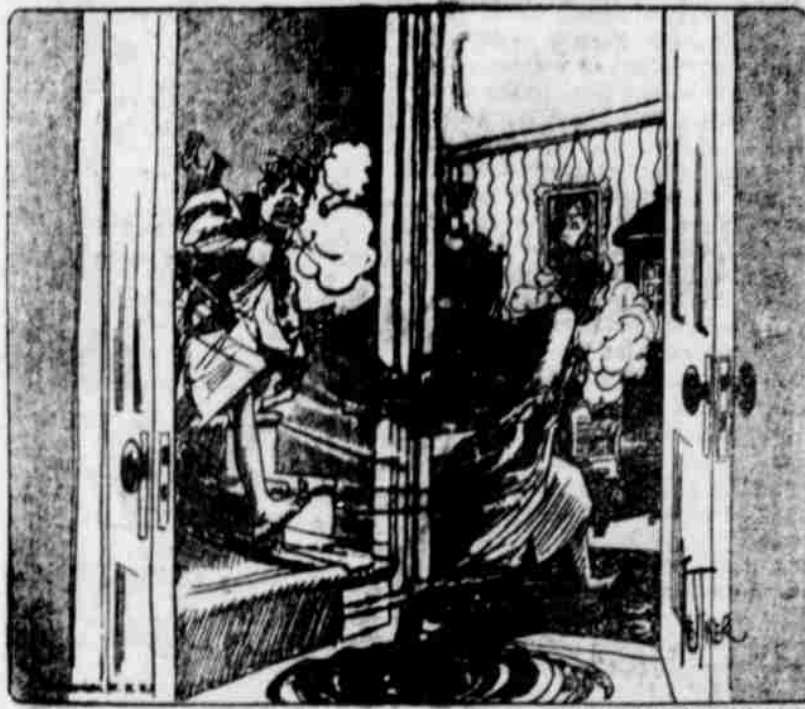
STUDENT BODY MEETING
