ANDREW CARLSON CROSSES THE BAR

Born In Sweden, He Pioneered
In Morrow County

Andrew Carlson died at a Heppner hospital Thursday, March 5, at the age of 81 years and 25 days. Funeral services were held from Cases Chapel, Heppner Saturday, March 7, at 2:00 o'clock P. M. The body was then shipped to Portland where another service was held in Emanuel church Monday, March 9, at 2 P. M. Interment was in Rose City cemetery. Rev. Mr. Johnson of the Emanuel church officiated at both services.

Mr. Carlson was born Feb. 8th 1850 in Brunstan, Sweden, and there was married to Sophia Carlson. They came to the United States in 1880, living in Illinois for one year. In 1881 they came to Oregon and took up a homestead in the Gooseberry district where they made their home for many years. In 1913 Mr. and Mrs. Carlson retired from active work and moved to Portland. Here Mrs. Carlson died March 31, 1928. Since that time Mr. Carlson has made his home with his son, Leonard Carlson, on the home ranch. He is survived by three sons and two daughters, Carl Emil, Victor Leonard, Oscar Bernard and Hilm Amanda Warfield of Gooseberry and Addie Caroline Olson of Portland.
