IONE SHUTS OUT CAYUSE INDIANS

BALL SEASON OPENS WITH A 10-0 SCORE

The baseball season was opened in Ione with the Cayuse Indian team and resulted in a 10-0 score in favor of Ione.

Ritchie had the Indians under control and but ten men faced him in the first three innings and their first two hits were made in fourth, two more in the fifth, one in the sixth and another in the eighth.

Ione opened their half of the first when Tucker was hit by the first pitch. Nosman scored first on a clean three base hit but was caught off third before Rich Lundell connect for a single. Rietmann walked and Ritchie was being fanned. Gar Swanson reached first on error in the left field. Akers knocked on to the school house for three bases and Frank Lundell ended the fray with a grounder to third with four scores over the plate.

Halvorsen started the second by fanning, Tucker singled, Norman made another three base hit and scored while Rich was going first on a fielder's choice. Rietmann flied to left and Ritchie struck out.

Gar opened the third with a two bagger and was out trying to make third. Akers popped to third Frank and Halvorsen each singled and Tucker flied to the right.

Norman Swanson kept up his three base swatting to open the fourth, Rich rolled one to short and Norman was caught at the home plate, Rietmann singled and Ritchie followed suit. Gar was safe on error by first baseman and two scores crossed. Akers flied to the right.
