BIG BROODER HOUSE ON RANKIN PLACE

DIMENSIONS 14 X 70;
CAPACITY 1500 TURKS

This week Harold Rankin, Rhea Creek alfalfa farmer, is receiving a shipment of 1,000 day old turkeys. In readiness for their arrival is a new brooder house, 14 by 70 feet in size and heated by hot water supplied by a coal and wood furnace located in the building.

This brooder house is the first one of its kind to be erected in this section and was built in accordance with plans of similar houses which Mr. and Mrs. Rankin inspected in the valley. They have been trying out their new brooder system on the young turkeys which they have hatched from their flock of ten hens and report that it works to perfection. Mrs. Rankin returned last week from a visit to Brownsville and Independence. At the latter place she visited the large turkey hatcheries and from this place the young turkeys are being shipped.
