IONE FIRST; BOARDMAN SECOND; LEXINGTON THIRD PLACE

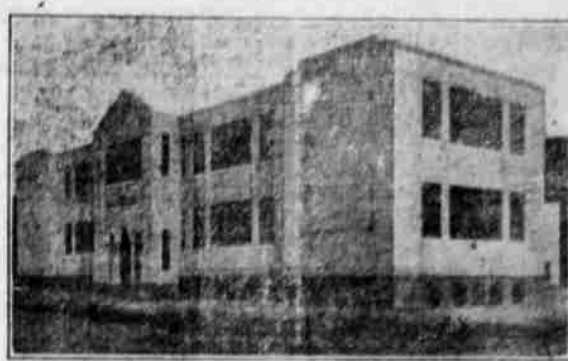

EDITORIAL

TOO MUCH LAW

The statement that we are suffering from a plethora of law has been repeated so often that for the uninformed and unthinking it has the force of established truth. The inference is drawn that our penitentiaries and our courts clogged with cases because of a flood of new legal restrictions or prescriptions many of which are the nature of unjustifiable interferences with natural human rights or are without the sanction of public opinion for the reason that they have no foundation in morals or public necessity.

The truth is that the great majority of the inmates of Penitentiaries and jails are men who have violated the laws that have been recognized as based upon morals and necessity from the earliest constitution of human society. They are the violators of fundamental human and social rights. They are guilty of breaches of trust or deeds of violence that have always rendered the perpetrators subject to condemnation and punishment. New laws in so far as there are any have for the most part been necessitated by invention and development as in the fields of radio, moving pictures or automotive transportation.

What people who know whereof they speak mean by such statements is that there is too much law in restraint of their particular vice, graft or privilege. In making a blanket indictment of law in general they seek to pave the way for the repeal of the law that affects their own appetite, passion or greed. Repeal means, for them, simply the open door to safe indulgence or easy money.
