## FUNERAL SERVICES FOR KARL L. BEACH

A Great Throng Present as Last Rites Conducted

Funeral services for Karl L. Beach were held at the family home, in Lexington on Sunday afternoon at 2:30 with burial in the Lexington cemetery. Rev. W. W. Head, pastor of the Congregational Church, officiated and a quartette composed of Mrs. Trina Parker, Miss Dona Barnett, Harvey Miller and Frank Turner sang several numbers accompanied by Miss Eulah McMillan.

Karl Langford Beach was born in Boulder, Colorado, July 4, 1876, and died at his home in Lexington, May 20, 1931, at the age of 54 years, 10 months and 16 days.

In January, 1905, he was married to Elsie Palmer and three sons were born to this union. These are Lawrence of Walla Walla, Laurel, of Los Angeles, and Harold of Lafayette, Indiana. The widow also survives.

Mr. Beach spent most of his life since his boyhood in Lexington and has been prominent in the religious, civic and business life of his community. At the time of his death Mr. Beach was engaged in the implement and hardware business in which he had built up an enviable reputation for integrity and fair dealing. For a number of years he served as member of the school board in this city and was a leader in Congregational church and Sunday School activities.

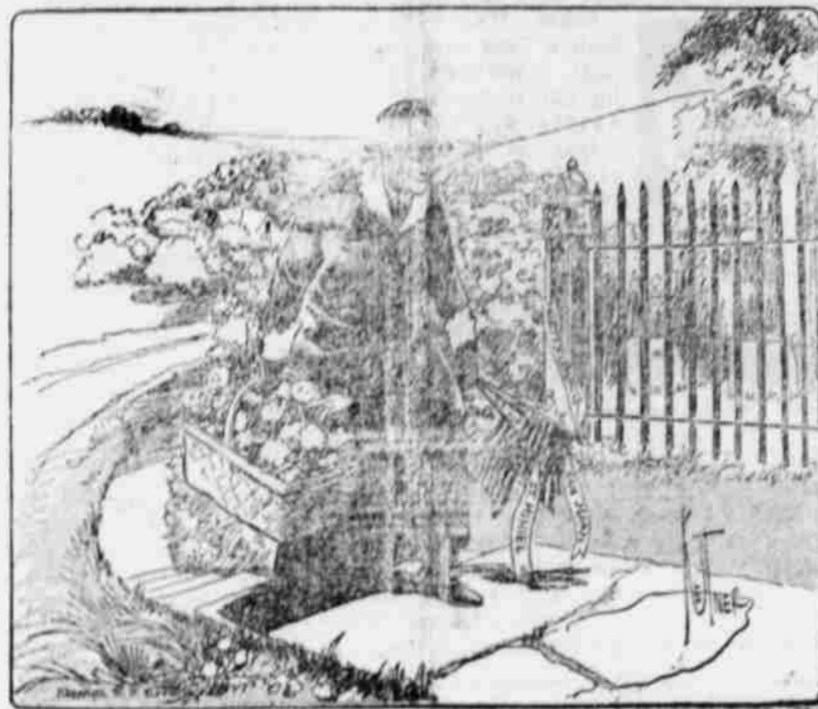
Pomona Grange will meet at Lexington, on June 27, with the State Master C. C. Hulet, present.

## PROSPECTS AT WELL SPRINGS BRIGHTER

Visiting Expert Declares Indications Favorable.

J. A. Harbke and L. H. Estes, of the Wells Spring Gas & Oil Co., accompanied by Sam Foster of Portland, visited the scene of the drilling operations, Monday. Mr. Foster, who is a man of years experience along this line of work, was here to give by the company in order that they might obtain his opinion of the prospects for gas or oil. Mr. Foster thinks the gas prospects are really remarkable and that the company is justified in making a test for gas. This test will be made within two weeks. A packer will be installed at a depth of 315 feet and a trap installed at the top. Drilling will be delayed until this test is made. At present the hole is 423 feet deep.
