The meeting of the National Livestock and Woolgrowers association in Portland this week is one of the most important ever held by these organizations. Many men of national fame are present and many able papers, touching upon every phase of the stock industry, will be read and discussed. The three principal subjects which the convention is dealing with this week are a better market, the attitude of the government on the land problem and the securing of fair freight rates from the railroads. The proposed independent packing company it is expected will take form before the close of this meeting and that machinery will be started in motion that will result in the establishment of a packing plant that the trusts cannot break. Much good to the livestock industry is expected to result from this meeting.

It has been suggested to the Times by some of the old residents of Heppner and Morrow county that there should be something done in the matter of advertising our county. Thousands who will come to Oregon next year to visit the Lewis and Clark fair do so with the intention of looking over the state with a view to permanently locate, and unless our people do something towards advertising the resources of our favored section Morrow county need not expect great returns for her share of the

capital invested in the Lewis and little doubt but what a railroad will be built to the Willow creek mines the coming summer, and by the time the exposition opens the mines will be in full operation. Our county is but little known on the outside for lack of being properly advertised, hence the slow development of her natural resources. However, it may be said to the credit of the county, that while development has been slow it has been of a substantial character. Under present conditions there can never be a more propitious time to do a little outside advertising. There will never be a time that we can expect better results from a small amount of money judiciously expended in letting the outside world know something of the opportunities here for the profitable investment of capital and labor in the development of our varied resources.
