Holdups Captured

Sheriff Shutt returned yesterday evening from Arlington with three Italians, who were captured Tuesday at Irrigon, in this county, by a posse of Irrigon citizens, upon a charge of holding up in open daylight a white man by the name of Horbern, and relieving him of a gold watch and \$6 in money. While the posse was being formed the Italians appeared for dinner, and hearing that they were being sought, made an effort to get away. They were chased across an arm of the Columbia river to a small island where they were captured.

Each Italian wore five suits of clothes. One, Guiseppi Rosa, had five drafts, amounting to \$550. They had in their possession ten watches, a quantity of jewelry, three revolvers and a shotgun. Each carried a razor and a stiletto. It is believed that they have committed various crimes all along the railroad, probably beating their way westward and living upon the people they robbed.
