## Conventions and Primaries

The Republican state central committee which met in Portland last Friday named the date and place for the state convention and made recommendation for dates of primaries and county conventions. The state convention will be held at Portland Thursday, April 14.

Each county will be represented by one delegate-at-large, one for every 150 votes cast for Judge Bean in the last general election and one for every fraction of 150 larger than 100.

The total number of delegates will be 361. In 1902 the total was 343 and in 1900 336, on the same basis of apportionment.

The State Committee recommends to County Committees April 2 for primaries and April 7 for conventions.

Conventions of the two Congressional Districts are usually held the day before the State convention.

These nominations will be made at the state convention: Supreme judge, dairy and food commissioner, four presidential electors, eight delegates to the National convention at Chicago June 21; four at large and two for each congressional districts and eight alternates. Morrow county is entitled to five delegates to the state convention.

## Roosevelt Club Meeting.

A meeting of the Morrow County Roosevelt Club is called for Wednesday evening, February 24. A large attendance is desired as there will be speeches by a number of prominent republicans, some good music, and a general enthusiastic meeting.

## Will not Resume Publication.

A dispatch to the Oregonian from Long Creek says: Editor C. A. Coe, whose newspaper was blown up by giant powder not long since, will not resume publication of his paper, the Long Creek Ranger. It had been the purpose of Mr. Coe to remove his presses into a vacant room in his dwelling-house, and, with the type he had managed to pick up from the wreck he expected to continue to issue the paper, regardless of opposition.

As soon as this determination became known, however, the same Nemeels that had pursued Mr. Coe with such dogged determination again became active. This time the unfortunate man received an anonymous letter in which he was informed that the publication of the Ranger must cease. Should he attempt to resume publication, both he and his family would be blown off of the face of the earth. He was further told in this letter that he must leave Long Creek before Spring, or suffer the consequences. The letter is said by Mr. Coe to be most vile and insulting, and is signed: "We mean what we say."

Mr. Coe says he cannot incur the risk of having his family slaughtered, and has given up all hopes of starting his newspaper. It is the general impression here that he will leave this place within a short time. He has gained the bitterest hatred of a large element, and life among them would be very disagreeable, if not really dangerous.
