The Long Creek Ranger made his appearance again last week after the blow-up, slightly disfigured, but still in the ring. It is evident that editor Coe has no intentions of being frightened away by the mere blowing up of his office but will rally his nerve force and endeavor to hold the fort.

While this is the quiet season Heppner merchants report business very good, fully up to that of previous years. With the never better prospects for abundant crops and stock coming through the winter in better condition than usual, the coming season promises to be the most prosperous in the history of Morrow county.

A knitting factory was established at La Grande six months ago and has built up such a large business that it must double its capacity. That is the kind of change we like to hear about. It is much better to start a factory with a small plant and enlarge it as business requires than to begin on a large scale and end in bankruptcy because the business will not pay the interest on the investment debt. There is room in Oregon for small manufacturing plants of various kinds, and if started now upon a conservative basis they will grow to be large and valuable properties in a few years.—Oregonian.

Russia's inward foe promises to be her final undoing. The prac-

tices of the Russian government in handling its revolutionary prisoners and the methods employed in banishing whole families to Siberian mines and prisons, sending them to the frozen north-land in droves, like cattle, to die by the way side if not strong enough to withstand the fearful hardships of the journey, is sufficient cause for internal eruptions. Under such conditions it is plain enough to understand why the war with Japan does not arouse internal loyalty and enthusiasm among the Russians. Late reports indicate that the war rather affords an opportunity for inciting a general uprising and revolution within the Russian borders. The revolutionary spirit has been smoldering for many years, and has only needed an opportunity, such as the present, to fan it into flames. Such are the conditions that confront Russia today which may mean a greater menace than fighting a foreign foe, and it may be, the downfall of the Russian empire.

The impression that poultry raising is a hazardous business has been proven by two Palouse farmers to be a money making business, according to the Spokesman Review. The same can be proven anywhere in the Inland Empire. There is always a demand for chickens, and the high price of eggs during the winter months every year is proof enough that large profits may be obtained by the careful poultryman. Poultry raising seems to have been somewhat neglected in the Inland Empire, even as a side issue. It has been shown, however, that those who go into it and give the industry careful supervision make money out of it. There is always a good market, and, as a rule, strong prices prevail for chickens and eggs. There are a few pens of thoroughbreds being started in Morrow county and there is little room to doubt that they will be a success. W. O. Minor and C. S. Lowe have stocked a couple of pens in this city and C. E. Jones one on his Eight Mile ranch. It is expected that these will be the means of stocking the country with the better and more

profitable breeds of birds and create a greater interest in the poultry business which it is probable will result eventually in building it up to the extent that at least the local demand can be supplied.
