The experts who examined the books of the late Treasurer Martin of Grant county, find that he was short in his accounts \$3641.38. It is understood that Martin leaves property valued at about \$3000, which will leave only a small balance to be made good by Martin's bondsmen.

It is to be hoped that the new irrigation scheme at Castle Rock, by Dalles capitalists, will be a success. If it is it means the providing of homes for a large number of families, increased land values and more taxable property for Morrow county at a much earlier date than to wait for reclamation by the government. While any system that may be built by the government will be one of the best class it will necessarily take a long time to construct, or in the first place to get ready to construct it. A few private enterprises will only tend to hasten the government along with the good work.

Senator Charles W. Fairbanks, of Indiana, will accept nomination for vice-president on the Roosevelt ticket. After a week's negotiations the Indian senator acquiesces to wish of the president to become his running mate, but it was with the understanding that ex-governor Franklin Murphy of New Jersey, be given the chairmanship of the national committee and Charles L. Henry, of Indiana be named as vice-chairman. These were the only conditions under which Senator Fairbank could be induced to accept the vice presidential nomination. The combination is a strong one and party leaders think there is no question but what it will stand the ball test at the national convention.

There is no more opportune time than the present for the organization of a commercial body at Heppner Morrow county resources should be advertised at the St. Louis World's fair, and if this is properly done the work should be commenced at once. A commercial organization is the proper body to take the matter up and push it along. If it is left for each individual to do his part as best he may there will be nothing done. An individual can't accomplish what an organized body can. The Lewis and Clark fair commission promises to see that any advertising matter prepared by any county shall be distributed to the best advantage at the St. Louis fair. A commercial organization could handle this matter very beneficially to our town and county. Not only this but there are numerous ways in which such a body could advance the interests of the community. Acting for citizens at large, it can accomplish what would be impossible with individual efforts. All important local questions can be advanced, and it can ever be on the alert to look after the interests of the town. The improvements and progress in many of the cities of the northwest have been due in a great measure to the activity of their commercial bodies. It applies as well to the smaller as to the larger cities. Morrow county has a very bright future, no county in Oregon has more promising prospects. Irrigation and the coal mining industry combined with her other resources are destined to make Morrow one of the foremost counties of the state.
