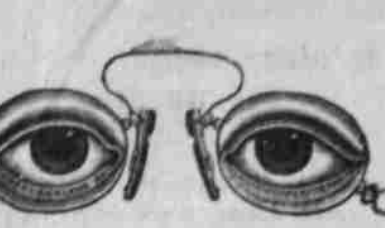
Summons.
