While politics seems to be rather quiet in Morrow county it is not altogether the true state of affairs. In other words things political are not altogether as they appear on the surface. There seems to be a strong undercurrent; candidates are working on the quiet, making a still hunt as it were. Both the republican and democratic candidates are active, scurrying about the country keeping their political fences straightened up and endeavoring to break over into the other party's field for an occasional vote. That is a very nice way to work; it leaves no sore spots and at the same time is effective. It is evident that the republicans have lost nothing, and as they have a majority of 250 in the county they are not suffering from uneasiness. Hon. G. W. Phelps, who returned last Friday from a short trip to Penuleton, has reason to believe that he will get a very large vote in Umatilla county which, with the large majority he will receive in this county, will give him a safe majority for district attorney. G. O. J. Curran, who has been traveling over the county considerably of late, is very much encouraged with his prospects and all the rest of the republican ticket. W. S. Connor, who has been through various localities the past week or more, makes a very favorable report. Sheriff Shutt, whose official duties has called him to many parts of the county the past week or two, speaks very encouragingly of prospects for the election of the entire republican ticket. The TIMES has information from parties residing in the various precincts of the county, and from all sources there is an encouraging word for the ticket.

In G. W. Phelps the republicans nominated one of the ablest young men of Eastern Oregon for the office of district attorney, and one who should receive his entire party vote. Mr. Phelps is a bright lawyer and a man is thoroughly reliable and trustworthy. He was a prominent leader in the legislature and is able and willing to take any line of action in the interests of the people whom he represented or any pertaining to any legislation affecting the entire state.
