Irrigation in Malheur.

Before the government will accept the Malheur irrigation project known as the Harper Basin scheme, the citizens of that county must organize and secure all the possible water rights necessary to the construction of the scheme, from private parties and make the way clear for the government in other ways.

This is the gist of information given out to Malheur citizens by F. Newell, chief hydrographer, and Morris Bein, his chief legal advisor, who have recently visited the Harper Basin project on a tour of inspection.

Following the advice of Mr. Newell, a Water Users' Association will be formed for the purpose of acquiring water rights and removing difficulties now in the way of the construction of the proposition.

The people of the county are enthusiastic over the prospects and have no fears that the government will abandon the plan, as the wishes of the engineers will be complied with in every detail, so far as lies in the power of the united people.

Rains Benefit Irrigon Ditch.

The recent heavy rains did not come in vain to the people of Irrigon, and especially to the Oregon Land & Water Company, whose big ditches carry water to the new settlements, says the E. O.

Before the rain much of the sandy land through which the ditches were built permitted a heavy seepage of the water in passing from the river to the land to be irrigated, and a very large amount of water has always been started into the head of the ditches in order to get a proper amount on the land. Fully 25 per cent of the water in the ditches was lost in seepage, because of the sand.

This condition has been changed by the rain, as the floods washed an enormous amount of silt and soil into the sandy ditches, and made them water tight. Since the rain the ditches have been carrying their full measure of water over their entire length, and the benefits to the water users and ditch company has been incalculable. It would have taken years of wash to accomplish what has been done by this one rain.

No amount of "puddling" could accomplish so complete a job as the sudden filling of the ditches with wash silt from the hills, and instead of damaging the property of the irrigon company it has added thousands of dollars to the value of their land and ditches.

Plan to Hurry Portage Road

The open river commission, which was organized at The Dalles recently, is preparing to take active steps toward rushing the right of way for the portage to a test and secure, if possible, some definite action in the matter of beginning construction of the road.

The commission believes that the damage suit brought by Taffe at The Dalles is only one of the Fabian methods of the opposition used to delay the road, and the executive committee of the open river commission is now prepared to investigate the matter and see if the people cannot get quick action in the courts in closing up the deals for the right of way.

The commission believes that if the people show a proper spirit in urging

the courts to hurry the matter, that it is possible to begin construction on the road in time to complete it for next year's wheat crop.
