

SELECTION OF HOGS.

Sires Should Be of Pure Blood—The Care of Sows.

In the selection of the breed one should choose the one for which he may have a fancy, as most farmers have a fancy for some particular breed, says a Michigan breeder in Farm and Live Stock Journal. We are rather partial to the Poland-Chinas for early market pigs. But the breed is largely a matter of choice, and any of the improved breeds should prove very desirable.

The sow should be bred to a pure breed boar, and under no circumstances would we advise the use of a grade. Use grade sows if you prefer the same breed as the boar. Crossing breeds and inbreeding to any extent generally prove unsatisfactory. Be careful in selection of boar and sows of the same breed. Their offspring will be uniform in color, which will add greatly to the appearance of the herd when you are ready for market. Keep the sows in good, strong, healthy condition. The theory that to secure good breeding results the sow must be a veritable walking skeleton was exploded many moons ago.

The practice of breeding from young and immature sows is not to be commended. The offspring of full grown dams will be larger, more vigorous and early maturing. There is also a measure of risk with the young sow. She may not prove prolific or a good suckler and so furnish scanty food for small litters. She may also prove an irregular breeder. When a sow proves all right in these respects and her pigs have the required feeding quality, she should be retained for breeding purposes as long as her usefulness continues.

After farrowing if the sow can have the run of a clover field in spring and summer it will be decidedly to her advantage. Cared for in this way, she will be likely to give to her pigs a goodly supply of milk, which will conduce to a rapid and vigorous growth. Any loss of growth through negligence at this early stage will be difficult to recover as the pigs grow older. A stunted pig is unprofitable and does not grow or fatten rapidly. The pigs soon learn to drink milk and slop from the dam's trough, and as soon as they are five or six weeks old should be fed a little sweet milk each day in a yard where the sow cannot follow. Fed in this way relieves the sow in a measure, and the full supply of food causes them to grow rapidly.

Sunstroke in Horses.

Should a horse when worked in very hot weather suddenly pant, stop sweating, lag, stagger and tend to fall, stop work at once, get him into a shady place under a tree where there is a draft of air, sprinkle him with cold water from a sprinkling can, bathe the back of ears) continually with cold water and give at once a strong stimulant. An effective draft would be two ounces of nitrous ether and half an ounce of aromatic spirits of ammonia in a pint of water or half a pint of whisky with like amount of water or in cold coffee. Repeat dose once an hour until better. For the fever never give tincture of acetone. Saltwater in ounce dose may be given once and repeated in three hours. Acetanilide, so popular among veterinarians, is best avoided by amateurs.—Live Stock Report.

THE GOATHERD

High pastures are desirable for Angoras. There must be grass. There may be brush. But if thorns, rough brush and briars prevail, however long the fleeces of the flock, they will pull it off long before the annual shearing time. Long mohair needs grass and leaves and grain to grow it. Protection of the flock is also essential. Annoyance or fear shortens the fleece of goats or sheep. It removes the flesh and fat. It reduces milk and meat. It is a sure destroyer of profit.—American Stockman.

No Money in Poor Goats.

A means of securing long mohair is the purchase of the best Angoras. Five dollar bucks and does must prove disappointing. One or two hundred, or even more, apiece paid for a breeding flock is compulsory. The great breeders pay the largest prices for their pure bred stock and are the true reliance of the Angora industry. The man who buys poor, kempy, cheap Angoras to go into the business to make money quick will soon declare that Angoras don't pay, for he will get only two or three inch kempy mohair, and a few ounce fleeces bring next to nothing.

The Angora on the Farm.

Aside from money value there are many farms where goats can be used to advantage. The tendency of the animals to browse upon brush, briars and weeds makes them of the greatest value in land clearing operations or in riding foul land of weeds. If they can do this work thoroughly and at no other outlay than their own cost and the cost of a good fence and shelter shed for winter it is more economical to employ them than to depend upon the laborious grubbing hoe.

Foundling Goats.

The breeder of pure Angora goats must give close attention to his flocks the year around. A doe will often leave a newborn kid to join her flock as soon as it gets out of her sight, nor will she return to her kid unless the flock happens to feed that way. Naturally many kids are lost and others would die if they were not taken care of. A few head of well bred goats may be found profitable on any farm, especially on a farm where brush killing is an improvement, as no other will destroy shrubs so quickly.—Country Life in America.

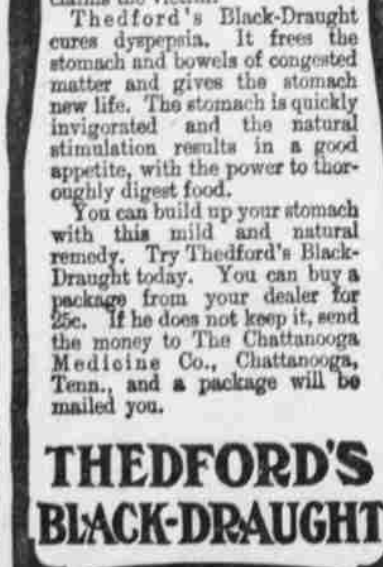
