Crescent Laundry Sold.

R. C. Wills closed a deal last Saturday whereby the Crescent Steam Laundry was transferred to Orin Clay Johnson of Hood River. Mr. Wills has been wanting to get out of the laundry for some time owing to the confinement of the work being detrimental to his health, and as a consequence he has turned over to Mr. Johnson a good paying business at the nominal figure of \$5000. Mr. Johnson and two sons will operate the laundry, and as they come well recommended, and are thoroughly familiar with the business, there is no reason why they should not do a good business from the start. Heppner people should patronize this home industry and keep the money at home instead of sending it out of town never to return.

Mr. Johnson will add at once a lot of new machinery and put the plant in shape to do work equal to the Pendleton or Portland laundries, so there will be no excuse for sending your work away.
