

A STRANGE DISAPPEARANCE

J. M. S. Lange, Who Came Up Missing on Last River Last January, Still an Unknown Quantity—What the Man says Who took up His Stock

Charles N. Motley, who resides near the sink of Little Lost River, arrived in Hailey yesterday. He is the man who, about the 24th or 25th of last January started out to take provisions to Lange, who was at Barnett's cabin with 1200 head of sheep. He says he was three days making 20 miles, in consequence of the bad traveling. At that time he did not know the missing man's name, but learned it afterward to be Lange, as it was stamped on a box found in the cabin occupied by Lange, and letters were afterwards received at Arco for J. M. S. Lange.

On reaching Mr. Lange's place, Motley found a cabin about 10x12 containing sheep both dead and alive. With another man he removed the dead sheep, and beneath them found the missing man's blankets, cooking utensils, a small sack of coffee, a can of baking powder, a sack of salt—about 49 pounds; a pot of beans, cooked, a razor, a letter written in German and a rubber stamp, which were all the effects found, except a shepherd dog and about 600 head of sheep, of which about 350 now remain.

It appeared that the sheep crowded into the cabin at night, where some died. The result was that a perfect charnel-house existed. The coyotes were attracted to the spot in hundreds, and every morning five or six sheep were found so torn and mutilated that they soon died.

Mr. Motley took the stock up under the estray law, and will sell them according to its provisions. Without his action in the case they must have perished even to the last one.

The missing man has never been heard of, although diligent search was made in the winter, and since the snow disappeared. Motley himself put in a day looking up and down the river and over the neighboring country. Some think he started out for assistance during the extreme cold weather, and died from exposure before he could reach his destination. This is the most plausible explanation advanced among the men in the neighborhood—Hailey News-Mirror.
