How dim the memory of the florid-faced, big-bellied, man who, when I was a chit of a child, used to feel of my pulse and give me medicines, some of which tasted so sweet that I wished to get sick again in order to swallow more. But I have a distinct recollection of a slender, tall, sober-faced man whose drug store I passed almost every day on my way to the village school, where I learned penmanship for a year preparatory to entering a sign school for the deaf. One morning at breakfast I had a fish-bone stuck fast in my throat, and all my efforts to take it out were unavailing. I began to get black in the face. My relatives were panic-stricken and sent for a physician. Before he arrived, however, the fish-bone was extracted, and I breathed more freely. Upon his arrival, I recognized him as the slender, tall, grave man who kept the drug store, as before observed. He shook a finger at me, and as he did so, made signs that he would cut my throat if I would not mind my q's and p's. I was mute and silent, for fear of him.

This physician was Dr. Ford, who afterwards became governor of New Jersey. At the expiration of his time of office, he took charge of the lunatic asylum at Trenton, where he had a son "dead on top." He remained at the head of the asylum until his death, which took place several months ago.

Several years ago after the death of my father, another family physician of his, also, was elected governor of New Jersey.

It is related of him that early in the morning when he was to take an oath of office at 12 o'clock, he walked all the way from his residence to Trenton, through snow, a distance of twelve miles, stopping at house after house to prescribe for his patients. He arrived at Trenton at 12 o'clock sharp.
