He was overtaken by Nailen and a deputy sheriff at Danimen's place, where the entire outfit was attached and taken back to E. O'Flyng's ranch. There was some controversy about the ownership of the wagon, during which both Ramsey and Nailen got hold of a log-chain, one at each end, which they proceeded to use as a weapon, but the deputy stepped in between the combatants, and in the struggle Ramsey got pessession of the chain. Nailen immediately drew his pistol, but the row was stopped before anyone was seriously hart. The remainder of the wool was attached, and there is said to be bad blood brewing between the two men.

The Hunsaken Horses.—After J. D. Hunsaker was arrested over in Grant county last spring for horse-stealing, L. F. Carrothers and Max Ramsey claimed to have bought a band of horses belonging to Hunsaker, for which they gave their note for \$1,500, dated some time in June. When the crime was committed, the State had a lien on the stock, but when Sheriff Dore came down to look after them a bill of sale was produced for the herses, dated January 27, 1888. Before he was convicted, Wm. Gray had succeeded Dore as sheriff of Grant county, and sent his deputy to look up the horses and see to the inatter of ownership. It was then claimed that Mrs. L. F. Carrothers and Ramsey took the horses as security for Hunsaker's bond which they went on after his arrest. The deputy sheriff has the horses collected but Mrs. Carrothers and Ramsey sent L. F. Carrothers as their agent, forbidding the sale of them. This case premises to be interesting in every detail, but the laws will not have anything to do with the antiquated inquiry as to "Who struck Billy Patterson," (No relation to the editor,) but to settle the point of ownership of the Hunsaker horses.
