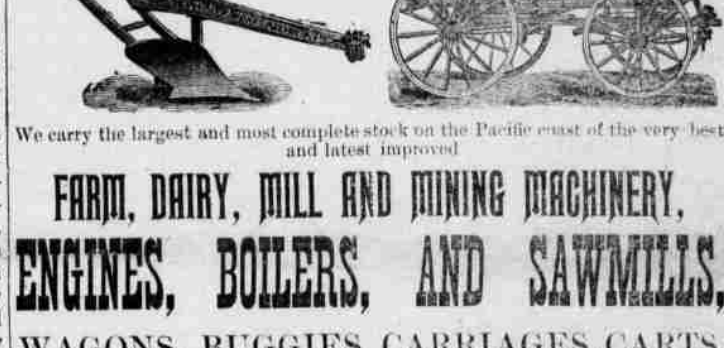

## MONUMENT NUMBERING FROM OVER THE HILL.

Mr. Connolly said that Johnson was between him and one of his lambs, and when he started to get the lamb, Johnson shot at him, but he supposed that it was only a blank cartridge, and was intended for a bluff, so he kept on toward his lamb and Johnson fired the second shot, hitting him in the shoulder.

## THE LOST ATLANTIS.
