State vs. Snow & Whitson; criminal libel. Verdict of not guilty. Friday evening, there were two motions for continuance in the case of the State vs. Charles Kinsey, Overruled. Saturday morning the grand jury brought in their final report which is as follows:

In the circuit court of Oregon, for Morrow county, Sept. term, A. D. 89, in the matter of the report of the grand jury. To the Honorable Circuit Court of said county and state, the grand jury empaneled and sworn on the 2nd day of September, 1889, would respectfully submit the following report:

We have been in session six days, have found and returned into court three true bills of indictment and three not true bills. In the matter of the county poor, we find that only one person is kept as a county charge and we believe he is properly cared for as an able-bodied man.

We visited the various county offices and find them kept in proper order, and the books of the several officers neatly kept, and the accounts correct as we believe from our investigation. We visited the city jail and would report that we find the same deficient in ventilation, and would recommend that it be improved in this respect.

The county jail we find properly kept, but believe that a high, tight fence should be built around said jail at a distance of 12 feet from the walls of the same, that outside persons may be prevented from communicating with prisoners confined in said jail, and would recommend that a fence be built.

We would also recommend that counting magistrates place material witnesses under bond to appear before the grand jury in cases where parties are held to answer, as many times complaining witnesses leave the state and do not attend the prosecution. Having no further business, we further recommend to make, we therefore ask to be discharged.
