It is as follows: MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 14, '89. Otis Patterson, Esq., Heppner, Or. DEAR SIR: In reply to your esteemed favor of the 7th inst., would say that this being the origin and home of the great Minneapolis Tribune, which has taken it upon itself to regulate and discipline this association, we are well pleased upon their publications. The clippings, however, are not true in any particular. The Minneapolis Tribune has been very careful not to use such language as is quoted by the Milton Eagle or they would have had a suit for libel on hand long ere this. It would be useless for us to attempt to suppress the number of small sheets throughout the country which copy and distort the articles printed here. We should not be able to do any other business for the next year, and could in that way use the total receipts of the association, and then not accomplish our end.
