COUNCIL MEETING.—Council met in regular session on Monday night, Mayor Blackman presiding, and all nominations passed. Bills allowed: A. D. Johnson & Co., \$1; Cox, Teal & Minor, \$50; E. J. Slocum, \$5; J. B. Natter, \$20; J. W. Slocum, \$150; A. A. Roberts, \$16,665; W. J. McAtee, \$2; Cox, Teal & Minor, \$150; A. G. Ott, \$75; costs, Town vs. Geo., \$57.00. Ordinance, an election and canvassing votes, and providing for publishing town ordinances, passed first reading. The office of marshal declared vacant, and Marshal Ritter re-elected, and decided a vote between Mr. Ritter and John Rasmus. There was considerable discussion over the marshaling, and at one time the marshaling of the council was more or less disturbed. Councilman Matlock was ordered to deliver receipts for sale of wood to treasurer. Petition of Sterling Smith referred to committee on streets and public property, and that Mr. Keithley be consulted in the matter of establishing grade for Main street to town limits. Tyson & Boyd were given privilege to dump dirt from excavation for hotel on streets where most needed. By motion, ball playing was prohibited in public streets. The subject of closing saloons on Sundays was discussed. The council agreed that they should at least keep more orderly houses and closed doors on the day of rest. A motion to adjourn prevailed.

DEMOCRATIC PRIMARY.

The Boys Meet to Select Delegates to the Democratic County Convention.

This afternoon the democratic primary for Heppner precinct was held in the court house. Hon. J. B. Sperry was selected as presiding gentleman, and the following gentlemen were selected as delegates to the county convention: C. A. Ibea, E. L. Matlock, J. L. Morrow, Frank Gentry, George Swagart, John Hughes, Thos. Quaid, Wm. McAtee and J. J. Roberts.

Messrs. Geo. Bay and John Rasmus were nominated for J. P.'s, Heppner precinct, Johnny Lockman was placed in nomination for constable, and Dick Neville nominated himself for the same office. The selection was made unanimous, and the primary adjourned without a murmur.

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

They Met in Heppner Yesterday and Selected a Ticket.

The delegates from the different precinct met in Heppner yesterday to select a county ticket and chose delegates to the assembly convention. The convention was called to order at 10 a. m. Thomas Scott, of Pipe City, was chosen as secretary pro tem, and C. M. Mallory as secretary at large.

The following committees were appointed: Credentials—T. E. Fell, F. L. Hoskins, D. R. Jayne, Ed. Cox and A. J. Cook. Order of Business—W. R. Ellis, J. F. Willis, and Messrs. Bartholomew, Keyes and Ed. Rood. Organization—Thad. Armstrong, M. S. Maxwell, Jerry Crossman, Wm. Fenland and T. C. Aubrey.

A motion to adjourn till 1 p. m. was entertained.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The committee on organization report. A. C. Peltys was chosen as permanent chairman, and C. M. Mallory as permanent secretary.

The committee on credentials report 41 delegates, Castle Rock not being represented by person or proxy. The validity of a proxy by telegraph for this precinct was decided in the negative, it being urged that as no primary was held there could be no representation. The proxy of W. W. Smead, also sent in by telegraph, was declared legal, as Mr. Smead was a regularly elected delegate.

The committee on order of business reported. The following were placed in nomination: A. Andrews, sheriff, with a vote of 24 to 10. Julius Hodson, clerk, with a vote of 23 to 11 on informal ballot, and as Mr. C. L. Andrews withdrew his name from before the convention, this was the only ballot taken.

J. H. Stanley, representative, with 22 1/2 votes out of 41. Wm. Blair, judge, with 27 1/2 out of 40 1/2 votes. Will Sailing, school superintendent, on 21 ballot, vote of 22 to 17. Leon W. Briggs, treasurer, vote 21 to 20. M. S. Maxwell, assessor, 24 ballot 21 1/2 to 19 1/2. E. B. Stanton, commissioner, vote of 23 out of 41.

There being no candidates for surveyor or coroner, the central committee were instructed to fill same from suitable material in the party.

The following are delegates to the republican state convention: W. R. Ellis, J. N. Brown, T. E. Fell and W. E. Kehler.

The republican county central committee are as follows: J. F. Holmes, Dry Fork; W. F. Holmes, Cecil; J. B. Ely, Alpine; Thad. Armstrong, Eight Mile; Ed. Rood, Dairy; D. N. Hardman, Lone; J. L. Keyes, Matteson; J. C. Large, Lena; Castle Rock; O. E. Farnsworth, Pipe City; D. R. Jayne, Wells Springs.

The convention yesterday nominated candidates on these tickets, divided "Court House" and "Tammammy." There are some spots among the boys which may not hold. The printing of the ticket to Mr. C. L. Andrews and T. E. Howard for re-election to their respective offices was "third term." HEPPNER'S PRIMARY.

An Exciting Meeting of Republicans and a Close Race for Supremacy.

The republicans of Heppner precinct met in the court house last Saturday to select delegates for the county convention which met in Heppner yesterday.

The assembly was organized by Hon. T. E. Fell who stated the object of the meeting. Nominations for chairman being in order, E. Norlyke placed in nomination councilman Mallory, Henry Rasmus nominated Hon. W. R. Ellis. Mr. Mallory chosen by a vote of 51 to 46.

For the past week it was evident that the republicans of Heppner precinct were divided. The two cliques were dubbed respectively "Court House" and "Tammammy." The election of Mr. Mallory was a complete victory for the former, and then the fun began.

Frank Snow was chosen secretary by a unanimous vote. On motion of Dr. L. F. Shipley, it was decided to ballot for nine men, and have tickets taken up by clerks as a formal ballot. The chairman was empowered to appoint judges, and chose Geo. Conser, T. E. Fell and S. N. Morgan; clerks, F. J. Haddock and Ben Leland.

The motion of W. R. Ellis to keep the polls open, Castle Rock not being represented was voted on.
