WEATHER AND CROPS.—E. S. Pague in his report of April 19th says: The fall wheat continues promising, the cool weather retards it; on low lands in the Willamette valley occasional patches are burnt. Spring seedling is being pushed. If weather continues favorable, most of the seeding will be done this month yet. The peach crop was generally injured by the cool weather on the 11th, 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th. From most every county comes reports of damage to the small fruit. Generally the peach, plum, cherry and apple blossoms are out in Western Oregon, and near the Columbia in Eastern Oregon. The warm days and cool frosty nights are injurious. The work has slightly advanced the blossoming and leaving.

THE IRVING ROAD.—Money has been raised in Heppner to send Captain Wm. Warren over to assist the Grant county viewers in locating a route from Bitter to the county line of Morrow and Grant, to intersect a road from Heppner over the most feasible route. The Grant county court has ordered a survey of their part of the road, and if our county court do as well, we will in the near future have a good road from Heppner to Bitter. It is to the interest of both sections to have a short cut across the mountains. Every live citizen will lead aid to the project.
