Heppner is ideally situated from many angles when the road program is completed and we should not surrender any of these advantages to other points. That we will have warm competition to meet is indicated by the propaganda being spread through the columns of the Pendleton East Oregonian, and in a recent issue there appeared a good editorial from their political management. point of view, under the heading, EXPANDING THE TRADE ZONE, which we herewith reproduce for the purpose of stimulating, as much as possible, the interest of our own merchants and business houses to renewed activity. They no doubt fully realize that Pendleton is well within her rights to reach out for all the trade that she can draw her way by virtue of the completion of these highways leading to that city, and they will offer inducements that must be offset by the business interests of Heppner. Our little city is just as favorably situated as Pendleton, we can show them just as good stores as far as they go, and the larger place can not put it over on us along any line of general trade. Furthermore, there is no good reason why prices here should not be just as attractive as at the Umatilla county city.

In talking with a merchant here the other day, who recently had occasion to look up prices at Pendleton, we were informed that on most any article in his line Heppner prices were under those of the former city. It is not going to be a matter of money saving that will draw our folks from Heppner to other points to trade, but it will resolve itself down to the question of going right out after the trade and bringing it here. Here is what the East Oregon-

ian savs:

In considering Pendleton and its future, much importance may be placed upon the completion of the Oregon-Washington highway between this place and Heppner for which contracts have been let. That bit of work, though it covers but a short distance, will link the two counties in a manner never before possible The results will be mutually beneficial and they will be farreaching From a Pendleton standpoint there

will be a real expansion of our trade zone. There are 5617 people in Morrow county and they have assessed wealth of \$13,000,000. Morrow county is a producer of wheat and also raises 3,500,000 pounds of wool a year. That county is nearly as large as Umatilla in area. It was originally part of Umatilla county and was cut off in 1885 and named in honor of J L. Morrow, a pioneer resident.

Heppner, the county seat and largest town in Morrow county, had population of 1324 when the 1920 census was taken. Other important towns include Lexington and Ione, but they are smaller than Heppner Pendleton is Hoppner's largest near by point and has long derived much husiness from that region. This business, however, has been retarded by lack of good highways. With the completion of the Vinson-Lens gap there will be an improved road leading up Willow creek from Heppner Junction to Heppner and on to Pen dieton via. Vinson and Pilot Rock The trip from Heppner to Pendleton will be made in two hours' less. It is freely predicted that trade relations will be greatly improved because of the work now under way
