whose first intimation that the bank was being robbed came with the robber's demand that she throw up her hands.

The robber was described as being six feet tall, of very dark complexion. He wore a dark hat with a wide rim, a dark gray coat with lighter gray trousers.

No estimate could be obtained from the bank officials early this afternoon as to the amount of money in the vault at the time of the robbery which the bandit passed up in his hurry to get away. The cash box in the vault was locked, said Mrs. McPaul, but the bandit did not ask for the key.

A later account, reported in the Oregonian, states that Jim Mayes, who was alleged to have held up the cashier of the State Bank of Echo and escaped with \$1500 in currency, was caught near Cold Springs by Tom Bollen and Carl Gilbert, who chased him

from Echo. When Boylen searched the car at Cold Springs he found nothing, but later at Echo all of the stolen money, gun and change of clothes were found under a false floor in the car.

Several thousand dollars in a locked cash drawer in the vault and more than \$100 in silver in plain sight on the counter were left by the robber. The cashier, Mrs. McPaul said, was out at lunch.
