High Cost of Campaigning.

THE primary emphasizes the right of anyone who chooses to become a candidate. He may be comparatively unknown while his opponents may be men widely known.

It has been shown that voters pay very little attention to claims presented through state pamphlets and it is a fair question if it is best that they should, for if the pamphlet were the sole means of informing them it would automatically defeat the man little known when his claims were presented in connection with better known competitors.

The result of this condition is that having gone into the race the new man is anxious to win and spends what he is able, and if he is honest does not exceed the limit. His friends also dig and as he becomes more widely known in the course of the campaign the number who desire his success increases as do the expenditures in his interest they will add.

The Farmers Tune In.

CONGRESS, convened for the short session, will probably try to enact some sort of legislation for the relief of emburdened farmers. But farmers will probably save themselves from being disappointed if they expect little from this short session.

Farm relief legislation ran on the rocks in the long session because there were too many pilots to steer it straight. The procedure promises to be repeated with variations during the short session. When farm relief comes up there will no doubt be little time

left to do any law-making after all the views are aired. And while the doctors argue the patient grows worse.

It is indicated that the farm relief problem will be linked up with that of dealing with the Treasury surplus. Previous legislation to aid farmers such as the McNary-Haugen bill was turned down, among other reasons, because it was said the cost would be too great to be met at that time.

Now the suggestion is being made by Western champions of the farmers that the surplus be used to give the help they ask. But there are others who demand the surplus be used to give taxpayers a rebate on the final installments of this year's income taxes, as advocated by President Coolidge. Still others oppose such repayments and favor general and permanent tax reduction.

In addition the problems presented by the World Court, railway consolidation, waterways, Muscle Shoals, alien property, and a dozen others will doubtless be debated.

This seem sa-long program for a short session but probably little will come of it.

The Short Session.

FOR the farmers radio has ceased to be a novelty and has become an important utility. Today the world's largest user of radio for informational purposes is the United States Department of Agriculture. Daily it broadcasts from 100 stations its educational programs lasting for a half hour or more.

Secretary Jardine says a potential million farmers are being reached daily by the department's educational programs. Within a few years, Secretary Jardine adds, it will be possible to have the attentive ear of almost every farmer in the United States.

Regular and careful guidance by radio can place agriculture in a strong and secure position. A lack of unity in thought and action has worked to retard agriculture. Radio can serve to weld the farmers into a strong unit.

Secretary Jardine declares this welding process is going on today. He points out that day by day each farmer and each group receives the same counsel. Gradually, all agricultural interests can be expected to share more equally correct knowledge of production and marketing principles, thus mobilizing their strength.
