THE metropolitan or big city I press shows recent inclination to stir things up a bit, particularly in regard to the make-up or the membership of Congress. In the last few sessions things haven't gone along as smoothly or as easily for capital as had been expected-judged by achievement of other years. In other words, measures or bills, such as the Mc-Nary-Haugen farm relief effort. showed a line-up not at all comforting to capital or the interests.
