This wheat is a new variety which is supposed to be smut resistant. In examining the small patch, Professor Hyslop found it to be one-tenth of one per cent of for-eign growth. A small patch was also treated with smut before planting and the stand now has practically no smut in it while other varieties of wheat treated at the same time and growing beside the Regal, are prac-tically entirely smutted. 
