POTATOES. Official estimates of the United States potato crop were advanced nearly 6 million bushels during October making the total expected production approximately 400 million bushels. This is 44 million bushels more than last year and 6 million more than the five-year average, but it must be remembered that nearly 22 million busels of the increase over last year is represented by early and medium season pota-toes which have already been marketed. The per capita supply of late potatoes is scarcely equal to the average amount, but the western states have relatively more than eastern sections. There is still time for re-adjustment in the potato situation. LIVESTOCK. Absence of well fin-

ished steers forced prices up on limited arrivals of inbetween kinds in eastern markets last week and everymarkets were erratic with most weak ness in the east. There was not much change in lamb prices although the market was unsettled.

WOOL. Hand to mouth buying by mills caused the trade in raw wool to continue slow last week, but prices remained very firm and the foreign

situation remained strong. TURKEYS. No. 1 dressed turkeys were quoted in San Francisco last week at 46-50 cents a pound. North Texas producers were reported receiving 28-29 cents for No. 1 and 20 cents for No. 2 turkeys, and South Texas growers 25-26 cents, live weight delivered at dressing plants.

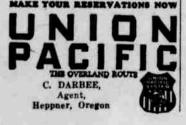
