## UNDERLYING CAUSES OF CRIME.

THE so-called crime wave has been much discussed. Authorities on crime believe that the continual printing of crime stories with pictures and minute details probably incites certain types of minds to the thought of crime.

A leader in crime study says he does not believe the oft-expressed thought that the late war tended to produce criminals, for few in the ranks were of the type to make professional criminals. He states that those who were children in the years from 1914 to 1921, are now young people; that during the war they heard many unwholesome thoughts expressed. They heard their elders talking about how to get all the sugar and other essentials they could, despite government appeals for conservation. They saw develop a spirit of defiance and individual disregard of law.

The average person's income was greatly increased, extravagant ideas were developed by children and grown-ups. Many preferred to indulge in great luxuries rather than pay taxes prescribed by law. These habits extended beyond the family through institutions. There developed an unwholesome atmosphere breathed by the children of the age, which children are now the young men and women from whom the majority of those committing crimes come.

The fact that this theory may not be in accord with that held by the majority, is one of the justifications for the existence of the National Crime commission which is trying to assimilate all the theories it can bring together and hopes to evolve from them reasonable explanations and practical remedies.

## THE GENERAL WELFARE.

WHILE the farmer and the city man are probably closer today than ever before, the bond between them can never be cemented too firmly. One of the great world issues of the day is the promotion of international understanding and good will. It is a laudable undertaking, but good will, like charity, should begin at home. And it does.

This country has many a diplomat who has never been in Washington, many an ambassador of good will who has never been abroad. In the smaller cities and in the rural communities these men and women have been busy promoting understanding and good will between the farmer and the city man. Their fame may never be spread abroad in the land but they are content to let their good deeds speak for themselves.

This community has its share of such workers for good will but it needs more of them. The permanent prosperity of this community and of the nation in general depends upon co-operation between farmer and city man. Both have much to contribute to the other.

The city man needs to know more about the problems that confront the farmer, and the farmer more about the tasks facing the city man. The farmer and the merchant, for example, are working toward the same end, after all, but too often they seem not to realize it. By striving to reach a common understanding each has an opportunity to be as great an ambassador of good will in his sphere as Lindbergh in his.

## BUSINESS AND ELECTIONS.

COL. LEONARD P. AYRES, a noted business commentator, believes it is a myth that election years are bad years for business. He shows that in six of the twelve years since 1880 in which Presidential elections have taken place business has been better than normal, that in one year it was normal, and in only five years below normal.

On the whole, Col. Ayres points out, business in years of Presidential election has been slightly better than normal. It is no doubt true that business fluctuations in Presidential election years are due to economic rather than political causes.

There appears to be nothing in the situation this year that might be regarded as a possible damper on business activity. No burning economic question has bobbed up yet and it is probable that none will. The national economic equilibrium is not likely to be upset this year even though it is an election year.

MINING booms don't have the glamour they once had. News of the uncovering of an old "hole" in the Blue mountains south of Heppner did not so much as elicit a comment by the Heppner Gazette Times which publication serves that territory. Likewise, very few Heppner people have rushed to take claims, although a few have joined parties from nearby towns in exploiting the prospect. The average citizen of today realizes that the mountain districts have been prospected for many years and that there have been few worthwhile strikes in recent years. # Dr. Frank Crane Says

## DEMOCRACY

Dean Inge of St. Paul's recently said that a government of, by and for the people is a clap trap.

It doubtless is. But a government of, by and for a king or an oligarchy or any such things is worse clap trap. As far as we can see, almost all kinds of government are open to the accusation of being clap trap.

As far as getting anything done immediately is concerned, the dictator plan, such as is accomplished by Mussolini and Premio de Rivera, seems to be the best.

A democracy is not the most efficient form of government, but it is the only form where the majority rule.

It is the only form under which people are allowed to make their own mistakes.

The only way to improve is to bump your own nose, stub your own toe and learn from your own defeats.

Foolish and unstable as the people are they remain the best basis for any government, and a government slowly built up as a democracy has much more promise of long life than any absolutism.

America may be headed for disaster. Plenty of prophets tell us that it is, but so far its record has been the most astounding in the world's history.

Altogether the efficiency of democracy seems to be that it can easily get rid of bad rulers, although it is not so efficient picking good ones always.

The question often overlooked is, "What is a government for?"

A government is not a people organized to accomplish something or to gain some advantage over another combined people, but it is organized to advance the interests of the people who make it up. The American government is a good one because the individuals who compose it are well off. The Russian government is a bad one because the individual people are bad off.

If we would keep our eye upon the individual more and less upon the combined individuals as a nation we should think more clearly of the problem.

The question after all is not what is better for a nation, but what is better for the people who compose it.

This vicinity who confidently believe there will be real mining activity in the Wallowa mountains in the near future. Heppner people used the coal for many months and it was found to be superior in quality to that shipped in from the Rocky mountain region, but it was impossible to finance the mining and shipping so the project was abandoned. During the time the mines were worked several personal fortunes were dissipated and with the passing of these fortunes went the interest in the mines. So, one can readily understand why Heppner people are not losing their heads over a gold prospect in their vicinity. If it pans out, well and good; if it is merely a wildcat prospect they will have lost nothing.—Joseph Herald.
