

## Local Happenings

Death came to Bruce Prater, son of Mrs. Susan Prater and the late I. N. Prater, at the home of his mother in Walla Walla on Saturday, Feb. 3. Bruce was aged 27 years, and for a number of years past has been an invalid, suffering with a disease of the spine, on account of which he had undergone several serious operations, having been under the care of the Mayo brothers of Rochester, Minn., at one time. He was a native of Heppner, and lived here a few years before going to Walla Walla with his parents. His funeral was held in Walla Walla on Monday, Rev. Guy L. Drill, pastor of the Christian church of Pendleton, officiating.
