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TAGGED COYOTES LIBERATED.

For a long time it has been the theory of stockmen that coyotes would migrate as bands of sheep were moved out to the mountain ranges, leaving the lower country and taking their abode in the foothills and timber sections, there to prey on the flocks during the summer season. In order to prove whether or not this theory is true, the U. S. Biological Survey, having charge of extermination of predatory animals, has hit upon the idea of tagging a certain number of the young coyotes captured, marking them for identification and then liberating them in the lower country. The tags bear the legend, "Notify U. S. Biological Survey, Portland, Ore.," and should anyone kill or capture one of the 25 animals that have been thus marked, they should report to the Portland office, stating where the animal was killed. Some of these coyotes have been tagged in Morrow county, and the others in different parts of the district. H. W. Dohy of the Portland office, has been assisting with this work. He was in Heppner on Monday, en route to Prineville. He reported that Harold Ahait of Ione began work with the service on the first of June and will have the eastern part of Umatilla county.

O. B. ROBERTSON ARRESTED.

O. B.
