

## Local Happenings

He has it fenced "hog tight" and turns his flocks loose and they care for themselves, not needing the attention of a herder. This fall Mr. Hanna bought 500 head of ewe lambs, and these will be run on the place and grow into a goodly band of sheep in a short while.
