An overdose of cod-liver oil in the mash or grain of laying hens may cause an unfavorable taste to the eggs and the poultry meat, says the experiment station.

FARM POINTERS.

Probably nothing could be done to assure a better quality of hay than to adopt federal hay supervision in Oregon and Washington, and in that way get the proper application of the grades to the hay, says the Oregon experiment station. Complaints are made that the results from feeding alfalfa hay are often not up to expectations. This may in part be due to a tendency to let the crop get over ripe before making hay. Thin, weedy or grassy fields, or fields with more or less old stubble, trash, etc., make hay that is poor under the grading system.

Bent grass seed imported into Oregon amounted to 121,000 pounds between July 1 and October 31 of this year, nearly twice as much as the total production in Oregon for 1928. During the same period last year 136,500 pounds were imported. It pays beekeepers to overhaul their equipment in the winter, making necessary replacements with only the best supplies, according to H. A. Scullen, bee specialist at Oregon State College. All extracting combs are looked over, graded and patched with worker foundation; excess comb and bee glue are cleaned from all parts of the equipment; parts that need retooling and painting receive attention. By ordering all necessary supplies early everything will be ready before the rush of spring work starts.
