

O. A. C. EXTENSION SERVICE WILL HELP E. O. WHEAT MEET

COLUMBIA BASIN WHEAT OUT-LOOK CONFERENCE WILL BE HELD FEB. 11-13.

Oregon State Agricultural College, Corvallis, Dec. 18.—Seven Heppner farmers have been placed on committee to make arrangements and gather material for the second Columbia Basin Wheat Outlook conference to be held at Arlington February 11-13.

This conference, called by the Eastern Oregon Wheat league, will consider many phases of the wheat producing and marketing problems and will lay special stress on investigation of the feasibility of a barge line down the Columbia. Charles B. Cox of Heppner, president of the league, with the other officers and directors, has asked the cooperation of the state college extension service in making the conference as inclusive and practical as possible.

Local men who will assist officially in the conference are Charles B. Cox, president; R. A. Thompson, on the committee on transportation; O. C. Wageman, on the committee on production, tillage and seed supply; Jeff Jones, on the committee on warehousing and intermediate credit; Frank W. Turner, on the committee on crop insurance; Chas. W. Smith, secretary of the legislative committee; R. L. Bengel, on the legislative committee.

Important Announcement

From State Board of Health.
Since December 10th the offices and laboratories of the Oregon State Board of Health have been located on the eighth floor of the Oregon building, Fifth and Oak streets, Portland. Many of the other state boards and departments will also be housed in that building. It is the expectation of the State Board of Control that the centralization of state activities in Portland in one building will prove advantageous to the departments concerned and to the state as a whole.

THE TREATMENT OF INFLUENZA.

For the week ending November 17th, 260 cases of influenza were reported to the State Board of Health. Now that influenza is undoubtedly epidemic in this state, it is well to know how to treat this disease and how to control it. In a preceding letter we warned the public of the possibility of an epidemic and gave a list of precautions to be

taken to prevent the spread of this disease. Both the cure and prevention of influenza depend on knowing the cause. The best way to keep away from people having this highly contagious disease.

When you feel an attack of influenza coming on, take a laxative and a glass of hot lemonade and go to bed early. Eat lightly, drink water freely and stay in bed until all symptoms have disappeared. Isolate yourself. Do not kiss or even shake hands. Just because some one has passed this disease on to you is no excuse for your being careless. This is not a spectacular course of treatment nor will it produce striking results, but it will cut down greatly the chances for complications, such as pneumonia and other infections.

The streptococcus hemolyticus is usually unable to invade the healthy body but gains entrance in persons who are run down by influenza. Streptococcus pneumoniae is a very serious complication and the chances of pulling through after this infection has invaded the body are none too good.

The importance of calling in a physician early can not be too highly emphasized. Many of the complications of influenza can be prevented by proper treatment. For the sake of others it is well to remember that influenza is a contagious disease and it is up to you to keep it to yourself. USE YOUR HANDKERCHIEF and prevent the

spread of influenza. Sneezing and coughing spray out droplets of moisture loaded with germs and any one nearby is almost certain to get a good dose of this. If you have influenza, go to bed and isolate yourself.
