New Plan Under Way To Protect Poultrymen

Professional poultry thieves of Oregon are likely to find their profits falling off soon when the plans made by Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, go into effect. The plan, which calls for recording of poultry brands under existing statutes, will be put into effect through the cooperation of the county agents' offices, where registrations and assignments of brands will be made, according to F. L. Ballard, state county agent leader. The marks will be legally recorded in Salem. Each county agent in poultry producing counties has been supplied with a branding outfit for demonstration purposes. The branding, a

TRAFFIC COPS TO MEET.

Salem, Ore., April 27.—A short course for state traffic officers will be held in Salem during the third week of May, at which time all the officers will be called to headquarters for an intensive study of the new automobile and traffic laws, and to hear leaders in traffic and law enforcement work speak. It is planned on a three-day meeting, with a program covering many phases of traffic control. There have been many important changes made in the automobile laws, and the officers will be coached carefully in matters pertaining to their operation and enforcement. The secretary of state has delegated T. A. Rafferty, chief inspector for the traffic division to be in charge of the sessions. A new style uniform, patterned somewhat after the officers' of the Canadian army, has been adopted by the division, and it is expected that some of the men will appear at the school dressed in the new outfits. It has been the desire of Secretary of State Hess to have the state traffic patrol outfitted with distinctive uniforms, in order to readily distinguish them from the great army of bus drivers, delivery men and others who have so nearly copied the present uniform. It is believed that the new uniform will serve the purpose most admirably.
