PASSED AT LAST.

NOT a panacea for all agricultural ills, the farm relief bill passed by congress this week, after being made the football of politicians for some six years, may not aid mater-ially in the disposal of the 1929 wheat crop. President Hoover aims to get the machinery in operation immediately, however, and with an-nouncement that upwards of a million dollars should be available this fall, it is possible that some imme-

diate benefits may result. It is stated that the farm bill as passed corresponds very closely to the program outlined by the president. It marks a signal vic-tory for his administration, though effect of its passage may spell the future of the republican party in 1932. However, that may be, a general air of satisfaction is apparent that at last something has come of the many years of laborious effort to put agriculture on the same economic basis with the manufacturing industry.

Oregon's own senator, Charles McNary, has headed the agricultural relief program since its inception and the bill finally passed bears his name. That he has been conscientious and persistent in his efforts is undeniable. To him the fruits of victory must seem very sweet. The bill provides for the estab-

lishment of a fund of \$500,00,000 dollars by the government for the purpose of making loans for the preparing for market and marketing of farm commodities, and edu-cation along lines looking to the ultimate elimination of exportable surpluses in the United States. It provides for the establishment of a federal farm board and advisory committees, and permits the formation of cooperative marketing organizations that may have the privilege of borrowing from the fund of \$500,000,000 up to 80 per cent of their capitalization.

It looks, indeed, like better times are ahead for agriculture, but the ultimate success of the venture still depends on the cooperation, intelli-gence and industry of the American farmer.


