She recommends that garments be dry cleaned before being stored away for the summer, since soiled clothing attracts moths more than clean clothing. Garments should also be brushed to remove moth eggs which may have already been deposited. Thoroughly sun the gar-ments—then put them away—and, if you are inclined to believe in the efficacy of Miss Kiethline's idea, use the newspaper.
