THE proposition that the government should engage in business has appeals to many citizens who have not taken the time to make a close study of the subject. Because the federal government conducts such vast business enterprises as the postal service, the development of waterways and highways, the conduct of international relations, the administration of justice, the national defense, the promotion of agriculture and commerce, and mediation between labor and capital, it is hastily presumed that the government could with equal success man-ufacture and distribute electric

products. Large profits are made at the public's expense by the power interests, boot-leggers, transportation systems and other public utilities, which explains the agitation for public ownership, but there is no guarantee that the government could render these services with less cost to the user. While the post-office department is estensibly conducted with reasonable efficiency, there are reasons to believe that private ownership might effect new economies to the advantage of users of the mail and taxpayers.
