The Lindberghs flew at a height of from 10,000 to 14,000 feet-more than two miles up in the air most of the time. That was the secret of their speed. By flying high, Col. Lindbergh believed, he would avoid bad weather conditions close to the ground. He holds that this flight has demonstrated that long-distance flying in the future will be at higher altitudes than has been customary. and therefore safer and more cer tain. Any flyer will tell you that if his engine is going to go dead or anything else happen which might cause a crash, he would rather be two miles up than one mile. 
