Farm Pointers

The important factor in the control of clover mildew is to apply either a lime sulfur spray or sulfur dust before the crop reaches more than six inches high, says the Oregon Experiment station. Ordinarily no treatment is needed for the first crop in the spring, but it is needed for the seed crop and is valuable if applied to young clover after the grain crop has been remov

ed in the fall. It is said that if man's vigilance in the war against insects were relaxed for but a relatively few years. insects would so completely gain the advantage that continuance of human life would be threatened. For success in using oil spray combinations for summer coddling moth sprays, it is essential that the oils in combination with lead arsenate should be applied immediately after mixing, and not allowed to stand in pipes and spray tanks, says the Oregon Experiment station. Sprays left to stand thus are ineffective in control and can be cleaned

off the fruit only with great difficulty. Estimations are that by the time

the 1930 seedings are completed there will be more than 15,000 acres of alfalfa in the Willamette valley and coast counties of Oregon where it was formerly thought that this crop could not be grown. County agents have been largely responsible for the introduction and promotion of alfalfa in this territory, us-ing cultural methods developed by

Conditions seem to be just right his year for general "outbreaks" of many insects which are usually present, but seldom in sufficient abundance to cause much damage. 

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
