Though long recognized as a power in circles in which he moved, his rise to head the state's majority party ticket as candidate for governor was scintillating, spectacular. Intelligent, capable, aggressive, he has ever held the respect of his enemies-enemies, any man must make by ever standing firmly on any question that presented itself, as was Senator Joseph's wont-and those in the enemy ranks will bow their heads in reverence when requiem sounds, in recognition of the passing of a valiant combattant, worthy of their strongest steel.
